G.RDENING NOTES.

If you have any trees or shrubs on order and they arrive during a spell of bad weather, it is advisable to take off the outside packing of straw but leave them tied in a bundle. Dig a fairly deep hole keeping frosted soil to one side and place them all together and see that the roots are well covered in frost free soil. They can be left like this quite safely until conditions are favourable for permanent planting. The same can be done with herbaceous plants, placing them all together in one hole slightly deeper than usual, gently press the soil around them and give a light covering of fern, straw or other light litter.

What with transport difficulties, rising prices and the possibility of shortages later on, it is advisable to order your garden requirements as soon as possible. Your local Horticultural Society can help you, so why not contact your nearest committee member.

GARDENING NOTES.

OTHER PEOPLES JOBS.

We have been saying in Bucks, a masterpiece of understatement, which could well be the epitaph of dear old Will Parslow. "If'e cun't 'elp ye, 'e wun't 'inder ye."

The Parslow boys were brought up on a small farm in Naphill, and early learnt all the agricultural skills. A local farmer, a man very sparing with his praise, once remarked to me, "there ain't much they Parslow's can't do;" and this was true. But small farms don't keep large families so Will and his brothers took jobs in Wycombe's growing factories. With many others from Naphill they walked across the common to Wycombe to start work at 7 a.m. and then walked home at night. And on summer evenings they went out and dug their gardens. A ten-hour working day was normal, but I shall remember him best as a cherry picker, at which job he had few superiors. GARDENING NOTES.

The proverbial April showers have been few and light this year and the Naphill clay has got hard and dry in consequence, especially in the newer gardens. Many have found it difficult to make a fine seed bed for the smaller seeds.

Here's a tip for future reference, one bucket full of soil, one of peat or leafmould riddled through a sieve and add a couple of pounds of sharp sand and mix. Then draw out the drill, sprinkle a little in it, sow the seeds, cover with mixture and Bob's your Uncle!

Sow runner beans and marrows after 7th. May, and make sure that summer bedding plants, chrysanthemums etc. are hardened off before planting out. Stiff, sturdy, dark green stuff is the thing to look for. B.

SOUVENIRS.

From Naphill the 31 bus plunges down Coombe Lane and reaches the gates of Hughenden Manor in next to no time, and now-a-days the Red Lion smiles a welcome in the porch. It is the same lion which Disraeli said had given him inspiration as they stood together on the balcony in High Wycombe High Street during his first election speech to the crowd below. Today it acts as dumb commissionaire for a building filled with memories and strange souvenirs of the last century.

Fixed to the wall just within is the side of the graceful carriage in which Mrs. Disraeli suffered in silence. The occasion was an anxious House of Commons night when she drove down with her Prime Minister husband, Benjamin, and her thumb was crushed by the carriage door as he alighted in Palace Yard. Nothing was to be allowed to distract her dear "Dizzy" from the affairs of the nation and she contrived to conceal the accident and her pain until he was out of sight. His coat of arms and motto, "Forte Nihil Difficile" are on the carriage door.

In another room is a portrait of "Tita", a curly haired Italian character with a Jimmy Edwards moustache, in whose arms Byron died at Misolonghi; and who afterwards served Isaac Disraeli as steward of Bradenham Manor for 16 years. Two large daggers were stuck in his red sash as he posed for this crayon drawing; but with such a Pirate of Penzance effect one wonders whether the people of Bradenham took him seriously.

By contrast a map with an aerial photograph of Adolf Hitler's Berchtesgarten "Hide-out" is a chill reminder of later days. It was one of 2,000 maps of enemy targets prepared in great secrecy in Hughenden Manor by the Military Survey Target Liaison Section between 1941 and 1945.

And then a souvenir of startling topicality; that Canal again. It is a photograph of an original 500 franc share in "The Suez Maritime Canal Universal Company" with the assurance that "This share shall be redeemed at par in 99 years and paid off by an annual lottery."

There is no comment from the Red Lion as we stroll thoughtfully out of the Manor and down the hill by the Church in the spring sunshine; to meet the next 31 back to Naphill.

GARDENING NOTES.

The one big topic during the last few weeks has been the weather and how we gardeners have hoped for that good old 'soaker'.

What can we do about it when we get these hot dry spells? Use anything that will conserve moisture such as grass, hedge trimmings, straw or other similar materials as a mulch along the rows. Keep the water can busy where possible, and the dutch hoe as often as you like. This latter tool if frequently used will produce a fine dust mulch that will do much to conserve the moisture in the soil. Lumpy, cracked soil lets out the moisture at a much faster rate than when it is fine and closely packed on the surface.

This parish presents several problems the key one is that it contains five centres of population - remember quite two thousand people in Wycombe Borough are in this ecclesiastical parish and covers fifteen square miles. The population in this century has risen from about one thousand to above five thousand. It has one parson. But let us be positive - you now have the Peoples Warden living in Naphill, Mr. Halsey, why not use his services as a line of communication? We have had Services in the School, terminated when the congregation fell to on. We have a very nice Sunday School for under sevens, run by Miss Pamela Kilby which deserves more support. Another teacher is needed for the over sevens, for years Naphill School was served by a teacher who lived at Sands! Why not local support? For effective working we need closer support and co-operation. Why not a small local group as a nucleus? Churches always have and always will be needed to sweeten human relationships.

Remember Gilbert & Sullivan's lines:

"When constabularly duty's to be done, to be done,
A Policemans lot is not a happy one, happy one."
Adapt the words to suit other walks of life and it might illuminate
most folks problems.

GARDENING NOTES.

Here are a few quickies for this month from which to choose as they apply to you: Sow red cabbage, spring cabbage, shorthorn carrots, cauliflower, spinach, turnip, endive, lettuce, onions, radish and parsley. Celery begin to earth up; onions to bend over tops; brussel sprouts cut off a few of the lower leaves; runner beans syringe plants in the evening after warm days. Strawberries sever runners from parent plant and transplant following week if wanted; loganberries and raspberries cut out all canes that had fruit this year.

Take cuttings of fuchsuas, heliotropes, calceolarias and geraniums. If troubled with eel worm on phloxes cut down stems and burn as soon as they finish flowering. Sow antirrhinums, larkspur, polyanthus and pansy seed outdoors. Prune rambler roses, cutting out all shoots which have born blooms. Do not prune climbing roses yet.

GARDENING NOTES.

Time to start planting bulbs such as snowdrops, daffodils and St Brigid anemones. Frosts can be expected by the end of the month so be prepared to place under cover any plants you wish to save.

If there are any volunteers for forming a group of Church people in Naphill I should be pleased to receive names - and then we can arrange some activity. I have in mind a door-to-door visitation.

I have read with interest the question about the origin of the name of this portion of Hughenden Parish. May I suggest that the origin is more likely to be traced if the very modern name NAPHILL be set on one side for the moment and the name previous to - say 1800 be examined Napple - or Naple. It is the modern "naiccuess" that has corrupted the name. The parish overs overseer's books of the 18 Century in my possession never once mention Naphill - nor do old maps - but Napple occurs. It was open common grazing land once, with just a few farms and cottages.

GARDENING NOTES.

GARDEN NOTES.

The continuing mild damp weather is not very helpful for many of the crops in store or for that matter many of the plants in the garden. These conditions are just right for setting up mildew, and the spread of disease.

Remove some of the lower leaves of brussels and other green stuff, particularly if they are yellowing or are planted rather close together. This will help to give light and air round the base of the plants.

Onions, potatoes and other crops in store should be looked over and, make sure they are free from damp.

Dead and decaying matter round plants in the herbaceous border should be removed, as they can, and often do, form a good hiding place for slugs and other pests, which can do much damage and even kill plants such as delphiniums, gailardias and lupins. After clearing away the rubbish and weeds, a light forking over the beds will leave everything nice and tidy for the winter. A.H.B.

GARDENING NOTES.

December is the month when the main job is to catch up with the work not completed earlier. Planting of trees, shrubs, bulbs and any other spring flowering plants.

Dahlias, gladioli and Begonias should by now be dried off, cleaned and stored away from frost. Chrysanthemums must be lifted and re-planted in a cold frame, or other sheltered place where they can be protected from the worst of the Winter weather, and put down a few heaps of slug bait among them.

Sweet pea seedlings are making good headway. Don't over water them and give them plenty of light and air.

Carry on with the digging and cleaning of all vacant plots.

Prune fruit trees where needed and spray with a good tar oil winter wash.

Lime is a soil sweetener and helps to break down sticky clay.
