Naphill Village Hall & Playing Fields Council - Chairman's Report www.naphillvillagehall.org.uk

At the last meeting of the village hall council on 1 July there were 15 members present. Some of the points discussed were the trustee reorganisation, the play area and the fundraising events. The trustee reorganisation is moving ahead with Judy doing a lot of work on constructing a new constitution. There are many points to be discussed and agreed before the new constitution can be sent in November to the Charity commission for their approval. Once approved by them it will have to be voted in at the A.G.M. in April.

Peter Williams has agreed to manage the play area and carry out the weekly checks to make sure all is well. The area between the swings and slide has been levelled so that the new adventure trail can be installed. Once installed the area will be grass seeded. We have had an offer of a new springy toy for the playground, more on that later.

The fundraising events were discussed and there should be a figure soon for the amount of money that has been raised by Napfest. I have been approached by two people about the possibility of having another event on the crick next year featuring a food and drink festival which hopefully will be a nice addition to the fund-raising events.

The upkeep of the Village Hall involves constant management and expense! Achievements and projects as follows:

• I am still waiting for the third quote for the soffits and guttering around the scout hall and men's club. Once we get the quote a decision can be made and the work commissioned.



- The fire extinguishers have been serviced and 3 had to be replenished as they had been discharged, not by fighting fires but by hirers! We do not know who was responsible or we would have charged them for the expense of refilling them! The visit by the fire engineer was comprehensive but cost over £700 and he recommended more work to be done in this area so unfortunately, we are looking at more expense in the near future.
- The fan in the small hall is going to be replaced with a more robust version.
- The village hall struggles to find enough storage space for all the equipment that we have for the fundraising events One remedy would be for a storage container possibly sited in the area by the tennis courts and the substation. We are looking at the options and hope there is a solution in the future.
- The garden around the war memorial is proving to have a problem as the hedge has grown and the hedge roots have invaded the borders making it difficult to grow any plants there. The hedge has been cut back recently but can only be cut back so far as it will otherwise go brown and not regrow. We will have to see what ideas come forward so we can decide what to do.

As you can see, there is always something needing attention! The committee endeavour to keep up with the maintenance but it does appear that as one thing is finished another one comes along. I hope you all have good holidays.

Sentinel - New Speedwatch video radar system.

Hughenden Parish Council has invested in a new fully automatic video system for use by the NAG Speedwatch volunteers.

The Sentinel radar device records real time video of speeding incidents which are automatically overlaid by vehicle speed, date and time as well as a unique location code. It has significant benefits over the manual system where volunteers observe vehicle speed on a large screen and then write down the registration number and vehicle model. There are no errors because each speeding vehicle registration number is recorded on video. Warning of a Speedwatch operation is still given using the Thames Valley Police warning triangles. Offenders will receive a warning letter from Thames Valley Police and if repeated potentially a visit from the TVP roads policing.

Friends of Naphill Common

Our 'Silent Auction' at the fete was, once again, a great success, raising very nearly £2,000, which will be shared between FoNC funds and the Village Hall. Well done to the organisers – Ron Collins, Neil McMinn and John Camp – and thanks to all those who contributed so generously.

We are enjoying – or if you are a gardener, tolerating – a long dry summer. On the Common the beech leaves have darkened and the beech nuts are forming. In the year following dry summers there is often a heavy "mast" year in which the nuts are produced in exceptional abundance. This almost random event has evolved to defend the trees against creatures that predate the seeds. Years of scarcity reduce the number of predators, and then a sudden, unpredictable abundance increases the beech's chances of successful new saplings because the predators can't increase their numbers quickly enough.

It is the season for enjoying woodland. Beth Foster has supplied the accompanying photographs of a hide made by children. You will see that no trees were damaged in its construction and there is no rubbish left behind, proving that fun is possible without spoiling things for other people or for nature.

During the summer the display of wildflowers becomes a joy, especially the foxgloves and the honeysuckle, but we also have some less glamorous plants of interest including enchanter's nightshade and some of the heathland species such as heather and heath bedstraw are still clinging on. However, the Common can boast some rarities. Look out for the scarce wood barley Hordelymus europaeus. It grows to a metre tall and has much shorter awns (hairs on each seed) than common barley. Of course, our real gem is – or perhaps, was – starfruit Damasonium alisma; a pond dweller with small, three-petalled white flowers (and no relation at all to the

tropical fruit you can buy in the supermarket). It appears irregularly and has long been on the verge of extinction. Indeed, if it is still in our pond that is probably one of its last few refuges in Britain, so if you are lucky enough to spot it, please don't do anything to harm it.

Many thanks to Marian Miller who, in June, took us on a tour of 'The Lost Farms of Naphill' and told us about the families that owned or worked them. A goodly number of us thoroughly enjoyed the walk from Coombe Farm in the East to Great Mosely in the West via all sites in between. The only tinge of sadness was that there are no working farms left in Naphill. Our next events will be our annual Bat Walk on Friday 16th August starting at 8:30pm at the Village Hall – bat detectors will be available, courtesy of the South Bucks Bat Group. A Fungus Walk will take place on Sunday 29th September at 1pm (again starting from the Village Hall), organised by the Bucks Fungus group and accompanied by distinguished experts to help us find and identify as many specimens as possible. All are welcome to both these events.

Meanwhile there are our regular walks. The short walks are led by Chris Miller and generally involve the Common and they are between 2-3 miles, starting at 10.30am from the Village Hall on the first Wednesday of each month. The longer walks are led by Ron Collins and are about 5 miles, generally some distance from Naphill. Join Ron on the third Monday of each month; meeting at the Village Hall at 9.25am for a prompt start at 9:30am. Members and non-members are equally welcome. These are the usual arrangements, but as there is sometimes a need to make changes it would be wise to consult our website, posters or the two leaders to confirm the details. Our working parties also continue, and again details can be found on our website.

Proposed Clappins Lane Development Plan

Wycombe District Council are at the final stages of preparing a new Local Plan which will set out the planning vision, objectives and strategy for the area between now and 2033.

Throughout the process Dandara has promoted land off Clappins Lane for housing and the Council has publicly consulted on various drafts of the Plan which have included the site as an emerging allocation since the start of the process in 2012.

The Local Plan submitted for examination includes Policy RUR7 which proposes to allocate land off Clappins Lane for an indicative capacity of 64 dwellings. The impact of development on the purposes of the Green Belt and the Chiltern's Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty has been assessed by the Council and by an independent Inspector who is examining the Local Plan on behalf of the Secretary of State. If the Local Plan is found sound by the Inspector, the site will be removed from the Green Belt and allocated for housing in line with the requirements of Policy RUR7.

Dandara is therefore considering the development potential of the site should the Local Plan be found sound and adopted by the Council and is seeking the views of local people at this very early stage. A public exhibition was held on 23rd July at the Black Lion Pub which invited feedback on the emerging proposals for 65 dwellings on the site, allowing us to take these views into account as the proposals develop. All the information presented in July is available at www.clappinslane.com for those who could not attend, and we would welcome your feedback on the proposals.

Dandara is an independently owned developer who takes great pride in the quality and contextual responsiveness of the properties it builds. We are currently constructing 280 homes at The Grove, Haddenham and have recently completed a scheme of 42 homes off Slough Lane, Saunderton which you are welcome to visit to understand how Dandara have sensitively designed the homes to reflect their location within the Chiltern's Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty.

Dear Residents of Naphill & Walters Ash,

We thank you for your ongoing support and vigilance on the proposed development on Clappins Lane. Some of you will have received a leaflet (entitled "Naphill News") from Dandara which suggests that the proposed housing development on Clappins Lane, Walters Ash has been agreed. It has not. This has been confirmed by WDC.

Dandara – the company who want to remove the land from Greenbelt status, to build an estate on it - appeared keen to hear people's views on the proposed development 'to ensure it makes a positive contribution to the area'. By the time you read this, an exhibition will have taken place (Tues 23rd July) where residents were invited to peruse proposed plans.

Whilst we still have time to feed back our thoughts, we urge you to complete the form under 'Give us your feedback' tab on Dandara's website http://clappinslane.com/ and reiterate your objections to the proposed development. Walters Ash Save Clappins Lane (AONB) Say NO to Greenbelt Development

Many residents remain concerned about the land being removed from Greenbelt status and in conjunction with this, the proposed build, which will first and foremost, have a devastating effect on all manner of wildlife and fauna within this area. It will also impact on both villages greatly, due to the fact that we simply do not have the infrastructure to support 65 new dwellings in the form of both blocks of flats and houses, for many reasons: the land isn't suitable enough to build on, the strain on local amenities (Dr's surgery / village shops etc), the impact of having an extra 90 – 120 more cars in the village, when parking is already an issue. Not forgetting the impact of having many construction vehicles in the area for the duration of the build.

The status of Greenbelt was originally given to specific areas of land in 1955, primarily to stop urban sprawl – and to protect borders between villages and towns alike.

A report from the CPRE (Campaign to Protect Rural England) confirms that as of July 2018, 519 Greenbelt sites, in London and the South East alone, were found to be "at risk". This has more than doubled since 2016, when they published their initial report. Their findings revealed that only 22% of the 460,000 homes planned, on release from Greenbelt status, would meet the government's definition of affordable housing and would go little way to ease the affordability crisis, prompting concerns that developers were selling "a lie". We have already seen this happen in other villages and towns in Buckinghamshire - new builds touted as affordable housing being sold for £400k+ (Marlow, Bucks). It has been reported that local planning authorities are being given no option but to release Greenbelt land for development due to pressure from central government. (Source: The Independent and CPRE).

The land of Clappins Lane is in AONB and building on this will set a dangerous precedent of removing land from AONB for residential development. Originally, 50 "units" were proposed – and this has now risen to 65, when the former proposal of 50 was already much bigger than is usually allowed within Greenbelt areas. It will change the character and urbanisation of the border of the villages.

Clappins Lane is a small single track road. Access is already limited and development will lead to significant traffic congestion. Especially with ongoing water mains issues when Main Road is closed.

The sewage system along the ridge line is already close to maximum capacity. Any development along the ridgeline will require an extensive overhaul of the waste water management system.

These are just a few of the many issues that we will encounter. Act now – protect our Greenbelt and our village – and show your objection to the developers at www.clappinslane.com

Growing Your Own

One of my favourite sayings is "You either have pests or you have pesticides". Thus, when growing your own fruit and vegetables, you have a choice between eating pesticide residues or eating completely pesticide-free crops. But we eat many more things that we do not grow ourselves (half our food comes from a factory) and these other things often contain residues of pesticides, herbicides, fungicides etc. What is completely wrong and unfair is that our food labelling laws omit such vital customer information. Such information should be given, so that the consumer can make an informed decision on whether to eat the product. If there is insufficient space on the label then a notice should be put by the product on the supermarket shelf.

Let me give you a horrific example. Do you like glyphosate in your bread? Farmers spray glyphosate on weeds to kill them all, prior to sowing crops. The recent revelation that glyphosate is also sprayed on mature crops of wheat and oilseed rape just before harvesting is a shocker. The farmers use glyphosate as a "desiccant" to kill the crops and dry out them out to make harvesting easier. Since glyphosate is a systemic weedkiller it must get into the grains of wheat, which are then separated from the chaff, ground into flour, then sent off for breadmaking. Now, on the supermarket shelf, if one loaf had a label "contains glyphosate" and another had "does not contain glyphosate", sales of the former would slump and farmers would stop using glyphosate as a "desiccant". But the government does not require such labelling. Whether glyphosate causes cancer is the subject of debate at the moment. In three court cases in the USA the courts agreed that the plaintiffs' cancers were caused by glyphosate and awarded billions of dollars in compensation. Some 13,000 more cases are pending.

Another shocker on bread is that to increase shelf life, the bread makers add L-cystene. Human hair is 15% L-cystene. The breadmakers use L-cystene derived from human hair and obtain most of the human hair from China. So we are, effectively, cannibals in that we are eating parts of human beings. Now, that does not appear on the wrappers of the bread on the supermarket shelf does it? We need all ingredients in our food listed in order that the consumer may make an informed choice.

All we can do as individuals is to write to our member of parliament and ask for food labelling laws to be made more rigorous so that the consumer is aware of what is in the product. Enclose a copy of this article as an illustration! Meanwhile, grow your own to ensure that the fruit and vegetable part of your diet is pure – and eat more fruit and vegetables!

Sun, sea, sangria and, teeth? - Torsten Moehl BDS

This is always a very special time of year, and nothing can beat an English summer when the weather is warm and sunny. With the stress of school and university exams almost over, and the excitement of Wimbledon and other great sporting events all but survived, thoughts are possibly turning towards getting away from it all with a well-deserved holiday. If you are lucky enough, this may even entail a trip abroad. So you've made your lists of things to take, thought about the new bathing costume and special evening wear and even stocked up on sun tan lotion. But what about your teeth? They're coming with you as well, aren't they? This aspect is often neglected when planning a holiday, but could cause considerable issues if things go wrong, particularly when travelling abroad. The following will hopefully get you travelling worry-free, but also help you when things go wrong with your teeth whilst away.

About three weeks before you leave, do visit your dentist for a regular examination appointment, and this should ideally eliminate any underlying issues with your teeth and mouth, and there should also be enough time for a follow-up visit with the dentist if necessary. It also gives you a chance to grab a few travel-sized toothpaste samples that are really handy to take with you! This is also a great time to check the condition of your toothbrush, so add this item to your holiday shopping list, as well as sufficient floss and interdental brushes, if needed.

But dental accidents can still occur, such as a cracked tooth. It is always handy to take a small dental emergency kit with you, which is obtainable at many High Street pharmacies. These commonly contain a temporary filling material to cover the rough portion of the broken tooth, which could otherwise cause quite a painful ulcer on the neighboring tongue or cheek. Do read the instructions on the pack before use, and be sure to chew onto the repaired tooth just before the material is set so that the bite is not too high, as that can cause further discomfort later. Refixing crowns or caps with this kit can be difficult, as it is essential that the crown is seated all the way over the tooth to ensure the bite isn't too high, and often there is excess material that is pushed into the neighboring gum area leading to sore and swollen gums later on. In the case of a lost crown, it may be prudent to seek emergency dental care, particularly in the presence of symptoms.

Dental pain can have many origins, and the causes can range from general sensitivity to a more serious underlying issue. Our holiday diet can be as foreign to our body as the destination we are visiting, and can involve an increased consumption of fizzy drinks and fruit-based juices, never mind the cheeky Pinot at sunset, which are all quite acidic to our teeth. Feeling a general sensitivity on most teeth to sweet or cold things may be the result of this acid attack, and one should ideally drink more water throughout the day to neutralize their effects. Using a desensitizing toothpaste can also help in covering over the exposed parts of the teeth affected.

Alfresco dining is always a wonderful experience, but can introduce more than what is posted in the ingredients into your mouthful. Unexpectedly biting onto a hard object feels utterly dramatic and can bring on a feeling of dread as to the possible damage caused. In most cases there is no major damage to the teeth, even though there may be symptoms of discomfort to biting and cold drinks for several days after; monitor this, and seek attention if it gets worse. If there is a crack in the tooth with the loss of a cusp or filling, a careful survey of the mouth with the tongue should reveal this, and one can cover this with the emergency temporary filling material. As with any dental pain that lasts longer than two days, doesn't go away with painkillers, or involves a swelling of the gum, cheek or jaws, please seek professional attention.

But an isolated swelling of the gum may just mean that some food has gotten lodged in or underneath the gum. This is quite common around the very back wisdom teeth, and the husks from popcorn are notorious for getting stuck within the gum. Careful mechanical cleaning with floss and brush should dislodge the offending article. As with many gum swellings or ulcerations, rinsing with a solution of half a teaspoon of salt dissolved in warm water several times a day can be of great benefit. One should take care not to swallow this solution, and for that reason it is not advisable to use in smaller children. Here one could apply the solution to the affected area in the mouth with a cotton wool bud.

Probably the most dramatic accident to the mouth is the knocking out of a front tooth due to a traumatic incident. If simple steps are followed within the "golden hour" after the accident, there is a good chance that the tooth can be saved. If an adult tooth has been completely knocked out, pick it up by the white bit that sticks out of the gum (the crown), trying not to touch the root portion. If it is your own tooth, lick any dirt off the root or rinse under cold water for no more than 10 seconds, then stick it back into the hole in the gum, making sure it is turned the right way round. Support the tooth by gently biting onto a clean cloth. If you are unable to stick it back into the hole, you can store the tooth in the inside of your cheek, or place it in to a container of milk or the person's own saliva (by spitting into a container; don't worry about the blood in your saliva). In both scenarios, seek the attention of a dentist as soon as you can. In children under the age of four years, the lost tooth is likely to be a baby tooth, which does not need to be put back into the mouth. In younger children of school-going age, it is probably best to store the tooth in a container of milk or their own saliva whilst seeking help, so that they don't swallow it by accident.

The cost of dental emergencies outside of England can be staggeringly expensive, and although your travel insurance may contribute to the emergency fees, it does not help with the remedial costs at the time of the incident, or when you get back home. Leaving Lonliness Behind

In last month's Naphill and Walter's Ash Gazette, we told you about the kinds of things our dogs are introduced to during their training, such as public transport, shops, cafes and even cats.

A hearing dog plays an incredibly important role in their deaf partner's life. Not only do these highly-trained assistance dogs alert deaf people to important and lifesaving sounds, such as the smoke alarm, alarm clocks, and oven timers; they also provide love, companionship and emotional support. This is important as deaf people often face barriers that can result in feelings of isolation and loneliness.

There is growing evidence that loneliness can have as much of a negative impact on a person's physical health as smoking 15 cigarettes a day. There is a proven link between loneliness and dementia. Loneliness can greatly impact a person's mental health. Unfortunately, people who are deaf or who have hearing loss can be more likely than others to experience loneliness and isolation.

Our dogs help deaf people to leave loneliness behind and reconnect with life. The impact they have on people's physical and mental wellbeing is something we see every day. Below are three examples of our deaf partners who have said their hearing dogs have helped them to feel less lonely.

Geraldine, who has hearing dog Bella, said: "I felt so lonely and lacking in confidence before Bella came along. She has dramatically changed my life and allowed me to reconnect with the world."

Vincent, who has hearing dog Teddy, said: "I always felt isolated, especially socially. I hit a real low point in my life. Then Teddy came along, and my life changed forever. I will never feel alone again."

Debbie, the mother of one of our child partnerships - William and hearing dog Nutmeg - said: "William had become socially isolated and found it hard to turn this around. I felt I'd lost him. He would disappear into himself, avoiding eye contact. It was heart-breaking. Since Nutmeg, William has come out of his shell again. He's not lonely anymore. He's happy at last."

Hearing dogs bring a certain visibility to a largely invisible disability, because they wear their smart burgundy jackets in public. This can help other people to recognise that a person may have different communication needs and can act as a conversation starter, helping deaf people to feel connected to their communities. All of this further helps deaf people to leave loneliness behind if they have struggled with these feelings.

We hope you have found it interesting to get a small insight into how hearing dogs not only provide practical support to their deaf partners, but invaluable emotional support too.
