

Naphill Village Hall & Playing Fields Council Chairman's Report

The village hall committee held their meeting on November 6th. There were 15 members present. Various items were discussed including maintenance of the hall. By the time you read this the plumber will have replaced the old pipes in the main hall and the small hall. This is being done as the plumbing system was based on a pre-war layout that used gravity to circulate the hot water through the pipes. All the steel pipes will be replaced with copper. The new system will be pressurised as are most systems today and will be run by a smaller pump. This should save power and give us a better system.

A few committee members met a representative from the National Probation Service to see if they could help us with the hall. We have agreed that they could help us with some of the decorating that needs doing and also, in the better weather, various jobs around the crick, including the play area.

The committee agreed there would be a change to the village hall insurance that would reduce the premiums we pay.

The fireworks event on November 4th was a great success. As I write this, not all the income and expenditure has been finalised but it appears that a good profit has been made for the village hall. I would like to thank all the volunteer helpers who made this event such a success. There were about 80 helpers and that is a fantastic number of volunteers for the village to muster. The bar served a pint of beer or lager every 10 seconds for over 2 hours and the BBQ served a burger or hot dog every 5 seconds!

With the success of the event also came the problems. The main one is parking. The committee cannot allow parking at the village hall so the event is advertised as no parking. We have never allowed parking at the event. We do recognise that there are problems and have considered various solutions, one being if the RAF would allow parking at the base in the car park by the two aeroplanes but then this would require a shuttle bus from there to the crick, and would people use it and be willing to pay a fare for this? Another thought for parking was the field in Stocking Lane. We would need more volunteers to staff it, lighting for safety and if wet a provision to tow the cars out, so this is not really practicable. I have even asked about parking at Hughenden village hall which could be feasible but their car park only takes 24 cars, so not much help.

In the past we have contacted the police for advice about parking but we are still waiting for a reply! Also, in the past we collected parking cones from the police station and put them on the main road but these are not available any more. The cones that were put out along the main road belong to the village hall. If you have any constructive ideas that would help with this issue please get in touch with the fireworks committee via their website.

The fireworks event at the moment is only advertised by sign boards in the village and also on social media mainly on local pages. No adverts are in the Bucks Free Press. There is a limit on numbers and on November 4th we closed the website so no more tickets could be sold. The tickets in the local shops and pubs were collected on Saturday morning so no physical tickets were sold on the day.

The bonfire and fireworks display were started 30 years ago by a small group in the village as an alternative to going to a display elsewhere. Previously I can remember being stuck in a field at Terriers after the event for over two hours waiting to leave with two children in the car getting more and more irritable. The current event has grown over the years because it is a great event. The village hall needs the income that the fireworks bring and if that income was stopped and not replaced by any other funds the village hall would struggle to exist.

The next fundraising event for the Village Hall is the Christmas Fayre on Friday 1st. December from 6.00pm. The Christmas Tree lights will be put on the tree on the 25 November and if the weather makes it dangerous this will be transferred to the following Saturday.

The village hall committee and I wish you all a very Happy Christmas and a Merry and prosperous New Year.



Growing Your Own - Essential Minerals



In the November edition of the Gazette I mentioned that it has been estimated that a third of the population of the UK is suffering from malnutrition. That may seem strange as about half of the population is overweight. However, one can eat too much and still be suffering from malnutrition. What are often missing in modern diets are essential minerals which we need in tiny amounts. Let us look at a few examples:

Zinc. We need about 15 mg of zinc per day to be healthy. Zinc deficiency can lead to lack of energy, anaemia, increased blood pressure, lack of growth, depression, schizophrenia, enlarged prostate and lack of sexual drive

Calcium and Magnesium. The recommended daily allowance (RDA) for calcium is 800mg for an average person. However, magnesium deficiency prevents calcium from being incorporated into bone mass. The average daily intake of magnesium should be between 400 and 800mg. Because magnesium is involved in so many enzyme systems a deficiency has widespread metabolic consequences such as loss of appetite, nausea, apathy, weakness, tiredness, numbness, tingling, confusion, disorientation, learning disability, memory impairment, vertigo, convulsions, epilepsy, muscle cramps, grimaces, jerks, tremors, flicking eyes, muscular incoordination, insomnia, heart rhythm problems, hypoglycaemia, abnormal ECG, pre-menstrual symptoms, raised blood pressure, osteoporosis, kidney stones, diabetes and joint problems to mention a few

Selenium. The average person consumes 35 micrograms of selenium per day whereas the recommended amount is 100 to 150 micro-grams per day. A person is often aware when the level of selenium has gone too low when chronic diseases such as cancer, arterial disease and arthritis are triggered. There are many other ailments which can be caused by mineral deficiencies. People who have heart attacks are usually found to have extremely low levels of chromium. Levels of cobalt are low in hair

samples taken from violent offenders. Children born to iodine-deficient mothers often have a lower IQ. The Mental Health Foundation have said there is growing evidence that good mental health is linked with good nutrition. An interesting study took place a few years ago in Aylesbury prison. Young offenders were given dietary supplements of 15 minerals. They then committed 40% fewer violent offences compared to a control group on a normal diet.

The list of trace elements which plants absorb for our use is very extensive and includes iron, selenium, manganese, molybdenum, copper, sodium, potassium, phosphorus, nickel, boron, vanadium, silicon, fluorine, aluminium and bromine. The only way to eat sufficient of these trace elements is to grow your own in enriched soil which is full of micro-organisms (since supermarket food is deficient in these trace elements) because agricultural soil is deficient in these trace elements).

By the way, if you are suffering from any of the above mentioned complaints you should go to your doctor rather than rush to the nearest health food shop and purchase food supplements – too much of some of these minerals can also lead to health problems - and you need to be sure that the food supplements are compatible with your existing medication.

Friends of Naphill Common

AGM - Our AGM will take place on Friday 2nd February at 7:30pm in the Village Hall. There will be a talk by Dave Brown from RAF High Wycombe on the history of the base in its various incarnations. An important item for discussion will be the decision by the committee to raise the annual subscription to £10.

Activities - Our regular walks continue: first Wednesday of the month at 10:30 for a short (1 hr) circular walk; and third Monday at 9:25 for a longer walk followed by (optional) lunch – both starting from the Village Hall. If you wish to join in with either of our weekly working parties, on Tuesday and Thursday mornings, our web site (where our walking and other activities are also listed) has all the contact details:

Because both working parties are dependent on the weather, it's always best to check with the organisers before setting off: Tuesdays – Peter Davis (HW 569303); Thursdays – Ron Collins (HW 562240).

Fungus Walk - The annual visit of the Bucks Fungus Group to the Common took place on Sunday 1st October. The BFG have been forced to restrict numbers on their fungi walks, as they were proving too popular, so this one was BFG members only (with a couple of 'native guides' from the FoNC committee). As usual they made many interesting finds, with around 70 different species identified, including the attractive Skullcap Dapperling (not previously recorded on the Common, and only the fourth ever record in Bucks). A full report can be found on their web site: http://www.bucksfungusgroup.org.uk/reports.html

Penny Cullington is the expert who identifies most of the finds, and she kindly offered to lead a separate walk for FoNC. In previous years, this had proved very popular and, to avoid being overwhelmed, we agreed to limit numbers to 20. Unfortunately, difficulties with getting emails to all FoNC members (sending emails with 100 or so BCC recipients – necessary because of data protection – tends to trigger various 'spam traps' on the Internet and so they may never reach their destination), and perhaps the necessity of a midweek date, meant there were too few

who expressed an interest, and we had to cancel. We'll review how best to proceed next year.

It has been a good autumn for fungi in general, with the Lion's Mane (on the Common) and Devil's Fingers (on Vincent's Meadow) putting in an appearance.

Felling - West Wycombe Estate (who own the majority of the Common) have informed us they have no plans to continue their phased thinning of trees in the immediate future. They do, however, plan to remove a small number of ash trees close to Daisy Pond (the big pond at the end of Downley Road), as part of a larger effort which will also cover the area around the Dells on Downley Common – the timber will be extracted via Hunts Hill Lane. There will be information boards and warning signs, but both commons are quite narrow at this point, so care will be needed. At the time of writing, we do not have a date for the start of this work, but it may well have been completed by the time this appears in print!

Ash trees are, sadly, subject to an invasive fungus that causes ash dieback disease, eventually killing the tree. The advice to landowners is that any ash tree (even ones which appear to be healthy) where the distance to the nearest public footpath is less than the height of the tree, should be taken down to avoid any risk to the public from falling branches or trees. We're fortunate that there are relatively few ash trees on Naphill Common, other nearby areas have lost many such trees.





Local Tales - A Haunting Tale

For many, this is the season of warm fires and haunting tales on TV, radio or books. As young boys in the 1950s, my brother Trevor and I would often go walking the lanes after dark, with my Cousin Eddy. He was a little older than us and, while we were reading the Beano or Dandy, Eddy would be reading comics like the Hotspur, and "proper books" and would relate stories – often ghost stories, that would thrill us and frighten us, but not enough to want him to stop.

Then, as now, you don't have to believe in ghosts to enjoy a good tale and I don't. But sometimes things happen that make you think. One such time was when I thought I must have spoken to a ghost on the telephone. I was an apprentice in an old furniture factory in High Wycombe. The factory, demolished now, was dilapidated then. It sprawled across St Marys Street in a jumble of buildings including two converted houses, an old chapel, various wooden factory buildings and corrugated metal sheds. Some parts were no longer used.

My drawing office was on the first floor above the main office in one of the old houses, and I could look across to some of the workshops. On one particular day I needed to contact the works manager. I rang his office with no response. I glanced over the yard and could make out his silhouette through the polish-fogged window of the finishing shop, he was chatting to the foreman. I attempted to ring the shop on the company's intercom, I have illustrated this apparatus above and you can see that there was a row of keys on the side of the telephone stand that could be either lifted or pressed to call various parts of the factory.

I pressed the key to call the finishing shop, and it rang and rang. I became increasingly annoyed at the lack of response and continued to ring. After some time, while the figures still talked, my call was eventually answered by an echoey and distant sounding voice of an old man. He ignored my plea to summon the works manager, indicated that he could not help and put the phone down. I was nonplussed. I wondered if I had rung the wrong workshop and so looked at the intercom. I realised that I had lifted the key and not pressed it. I had rung somewhere else. Wherever it was I could not tell as there was no label on the intercom, yet it had been answered. This was not impossible because some 'phones were in long abandoned workshops. But I was intrigued to know where and who it was that answered.

To find out, I got the office boy to go round the factory while I continued to press the telephone key. Eventually he reappeared and said that he had found the workshop and that he had not answered the telephone because it was rather difficult to get to. I followed him into the factory and to a derelict workshop attached to the old chapel. It was stacked with unused chair frames that made it awkward to reach a dust covered workbench on which stood a telephone. I struggled across and all seemed undisturbed as it had been for years. The only explanation was that, when the 'phone rang, someone had been walking through the workshop, despite it not really leading anywhere. But what intrigued me was the answer given to my request to speak to the works manager. The ghostly reply was a sad sounding – "there's no one here".

One Step at a Time

Sometimes life gets in the way and puts paid to plans to exercise regularly and once this happens the thought of getting back into shape can feel very daunting. If this sounds familiar, then read on for some tips about how to approach this in a simple and positive way.

The most rewarding part of my job is sharing clients' sense of achievement as they realise they can do daily tasks again, or even better, can do things that they couldn't do before, in a pain-free way. I am not talking about running marathons, although this is a fantastic achievement, I am talking about activities of daily living such as standing up from a chair, lifting, carrying, walking, gardening, running, picking things up from the floor, to name but a few. These achievements whilst they might sound small are literally life changing.

Spend a few minutes thinking about one or more physical tasks that you would like to, or need to, be able to do but find difficult or painful at present. Here are some examples to get you thinking

- · Climbing over a stile
- Getting up out of a very soft sofa
- Picking up the TV remote from the floor
- · Carrying shopping bags
- Walking up hill or climbing steps or stepping off the pavement

Once you have identified one or more tasks, then think about what is getting in the way of completing them, it may be due to one or more of the following, lack of upper or lower body strength, difficulty balancing, chronic low back pain or lack of cardiovascular fitness.

From there, the best way to improve one of these areas is to practice a simpler version of the movement, for instance, if you want to improve your leg strength to help you stand up from a soft or low chair then practice standing up from a higher chair more regularly until you feel that this becomes easier and then progress by doing the same from a lower chair.

Sometimes you may need to break down the movement and practice one part of it. Taking the example of climbing over a stile, you may have issues with the initial step up, so you can improve this by practicing that step up on your stairs, holding the banister as needed.

The key thing is that you start doing something that moves you towards where you want to be, and you will find that applying this approach across different activities will soon amount to significant progress. Just think what you could achieve by Christmas if you start

Gordon the Bird Man

On the one hand, Great Britain is in the enviable position of being the sixth richest nation in the world. But is also in the unenviable position of being in the bottom ten percent of least biodiverse nations on Earth. Biodiversity loss is one of the biggest environmental threats globally and protecting areas of land and sea is one approach to tackling this. However, it can be difficult to measure how effectively such protected areas actually work.

This country has three main types of statutorily designated protected areas that benefit birds: Sites of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI), Special Protection Areas (SPAs) and Special Areas of Conservation (SACs). The second two were originally designated by European 2000 legislation currently retained in UK law following Brexit.

But this could change. Policy measures aimed at reversing the declines in terrestrial biodiversity mainly focus on Agri-Environment or Land Management Schemes (AES). These compromise multiple options for farmers that each have different environmental objectives. While these objects are based on evidence from trials, only measurement of actual effects can reveal whether they deliver in practice. Problems may arise from unforseen background factors, from guidelines not being followed or simply from poor uptake.

One option with the potential to have strongly positive effects on birds in arable land is known as AB14 within the English Countryside Scheme of which the Environmental Land Management Scheme (ELMS) is a part. This option involves low input harvested cereals sown at a lower density than usual and treated with minimal chemical input. The aim is to create an open crop structure with a diverse flora of non-crop plants that in turn support insects that pollenate other crops and also provide food for birds. The crop is harvested and scheme payments cover the income lost by farmers who implement this option.

Research on an evaluation of AB14 in 2022 to find the effect on implementation in practice and the attitudes of the farming community to AB14, found the main reasons for low take up were inadequate financial payments to cover losses, weed issues and not fitting in with existing farming systems.

The UN Convention for Biological Diversity last year set out a framework, which included a target of 30% of land and sea to be protected by 2030. In one of the least biodiverse nations on Earth where the legislation underpinning protected areas might be on the verge of being scrapped, it has been demonstrated just how vital protected areas are for birds. It just requires long term commitment and money. Remember the first sentence of this article and wonder where all the trillions go.

Got the Christmas Blues?

'Tis the season to be jolly..... Or is it? Not everyone looks forward to Christmas and it can be a time which triggers emotional challenges.

Even if you're surrounded by family, relations can be fraught and bring up old wounds. If life already feels lonely, Christmas often makes that worse - especially if it seems like everyone else is having all the fun.

It's beginning to look a lot like Christmas

For many of us, Christmas is a time for family and friends, fantastic food and presents. But did you know that Christmas can be hazardous and stressful for your pooches?

With a bit of planning and preparation, your dog can stay happy and safe over the festive season, as well as perhaps, a little bit spoilt too!

- Some of our festive foods can be dangerous for dogs to eat, such as chocolate, mince pies, Christmas pudding, onion gravy, alcohol and bones from carcasses (can be a choking hazard). We all love to give our pooches treats and I'm as guilty of this as anyone, so a bit of white turkey meat is sure to get their tails wagging! You can always make treats for your dog ahead of time, such as stuffed kongs, treat balls and lick mats to give them during the festive season (see below for a very simple dog biscuit recipe)
- Additional plants can also appear in our homes at this time of year, which can cause harm, so if you do have plants such as poinsettias, holly, ivy, mistletoe and lillies, be sure to keep them out of reach.
- There are some incredible Christmas decorations available, but again, these can look very tempting hanging from a tree, or around the house, so take a moment to see whether this could be a potential hazard.

- As well as consuming items that could cause harm, a change in routine can be stressful. Try to stick to your dog's usual routine for walking, meal times etc, which will help keep them calm.
- Lots of people in the house can be overwhelming for your dog, so give them somewhere cosy and quiet to retreat to, whether at home or away, with familiar toys & treats.

Honey & Banana Dog Biscuit recipe – A simple and cost effective Christmas treat (or gift) for your pooch! (makes about 45 biscuits)

Prep Time: 15 mins **Cook Time:** 20 mins

Ingredients:

250 ml water

1 banana, mashed

1 tablespoon of honey

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

1 egg 600g whole wheat flour

1 teaspoon baking powder

Directions: Preheat oven to 180 degrees C

Lightly grease 2 large baking sheets

Combine water, mashed bananas, honey, vanilla, and egg in a large bowl

Stir in whole-wheat flour and baking powder

Mix until ingredients are thoroughly combined

Turn dough onto a floured surface and knead until no longer sticky

Roll out dough to 1/4-inch thickness and cut into mini shapes with a cookie cutter

Place dough shapes on prepared baking sheets & bake in preheated oven until cookies are lightly browned, about 20 minutes

Transfer to a wire tray and leave to completely cool. Wishing you all a merry Christmas and a Happy 2024,

I am bombarded by leaflets urging me to buy a new carpet/sofa/cooker 'in time for Christmas'. The local pubs are awash with flyers for their 'festive menu' (usually over priced and under imaginative!) and my inbox is full of emails urging me to book online to earn a discount for my festive feasting or buy this year's 'must have' Christmas fashion garment. Regular readers of the Gazette know I am a self-confessed 'Christmasphile', but I do draw the line at over the packaged, single-use tat that ends up in the bin on Boxing Day (unless the single use involves drinking, eating or bathing!).

Something that I found especially disturbing this year was a whole edition of a well known Radio 4 consumer programme with the title 'How will you afford Christmas this year?' That was a red rag to a bull for me. I phoned and emailed the programme's contacts with my message – you don't need to 'afford' Christmas; it's NOT about spending. Needless to say, my contributions did not get aired. I would like to think this was due to the sheer volume of messages the programmers had received, but given the overall content of the broadcast, I think it was more about my message being unacceptable.

People emailed and rang in telling about getting bank loans, feeling the pressure to keep up with peer or family spending, maxing their credit cards and hoping they will be able to pay the resulting bills in the New Year. My heart sank lower and lower. It does not have to be this way; this is not what Christmas is about I inwardly cried.

When we are surrounded by all the excess the marketers would have us indulge in, it completely masks the real meaning of Christmas. At its heart is a harsh story of poverty, displacement, oppression and injustice. Christmas is the time when we celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ, the Son of God. It celebrates a moment in time when God came to earth in human form to live amongst us. It celebrates the greatest story ever told. It celebrates hope. The clue is in the name given to the services that mark this event - Christ Mass. Although he was the Son of God, Jesus was born in a stable, lived his life under an occupying power and eventually suffered a cruel, unjust death. Even if you do not profess to being a 'Christian', at least take the words of Jesus seriously. Words that speak of justice, equality, mercy, love and contentment; words that eventually got him killed because the ideas they embodied were seen as such a threat to the powers that be.

As you celebrate this year, please think about the real meaning of Christ Mass. 



However, that seems too easy and unadventurous; basically, get lots of bottles of anything you already like and tuck in – there, the perfect pairing advice!

Instead, I thought it would be more useful (here, useful is a synonym for 'utterly useless') to offer answers to questions you have never asked...which wines closest resemble the characters in some of the most frequently viewed festive films?!

Kevin McCallister (Macaulay Culkin) – Home Alone/ Home Alone 2 - I had to start with the main character in the greatest of all Christmas films! Kevin is playful, fun, energetic, unpretentious and clearly a bit naughty.
