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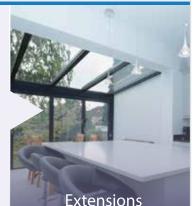

#### Chairman's Regular Report

At the May 8 Meeting of the Village Hall committee there were 11 members present.

The meeting was started at 7.30 and being restricted to 30 minutes only a few items were discussed, as the AGM was due be held at 8.00. The main item discussed was the decorating of the kitchen and the main hall. The committee agreed that this should go ahead and the work will be done when the rental schedule allows. After a couple of other items Paul Riglar and I presented a gift and a bouquet of flowers to Norma Clarke for her services to the village hall. The meeting closed at 8.00 and the AGM started. There were 2 members of the public in attendance.

The AGM was a relatively short meeting at just over an hour. I gave a short speech on how the hall and playing field had progressed over the past year and the Treasurer also spoke to outline the year's finances. One member of the public raised a point over the donation from Mr. Sweet, that he hoped the donation would be used for a specific item, and then it could be attributed to Mr. Sweet.

On reflection, the poor turnout for the AGM was just one example of how difficult it now is to get people in the village to join in and help with the various events that the village hall needs organised to keep its finances in order. The treasurer told us that the committee needs in the region of £28000 to keep the hall open for a year, so if we have a couple of years without raising a substantial amount the hall will struggle to keep its doors open.

There will not be a Fete this year, the Fete committee is down to 2 or 3 members and cannot organise the event without volunteers, this in turn will mean less revenue for the hall. Now I realise that not everyone in the village uses the hall but there are also the other groups that operate under the hall's umbrella, the scouts and guides, cubs and brownies operate from village hall premises. The football club with many junior players. The tennis club and the men's club would all struggle if the hall had to cut back to make the finances cover its costs. The village hall is independent and owned by the village by way of a trust that the village hall committee administers. The trustees are financially liable for any shortfalls, so we are very aware of the finances and would not put ourselves in a position that would incur us having to put money in to keep the hall going. The village hall needs people to help us run the hall and events, otherwise in a few years the hall might end up being shut or even sold.

#### Chairman's AGM report 2024

This past year has been another year of continuing work on the village hall. The committee has instigated several improvements to the hall and the playing fields.

In terms of cost, the most expensive was the updating of the heating system. This was undertaken, as although the new boilers were working well, the 1930's plumbing was not capable of delivering the required heat to all parts of the hall. This resulted in all sorts of problems and the outcome was to re-pipe all the radiators and include modern valves in the system to control the heat flow to the areas that required it. The system after a few teething problems is working correctly. This has cost the village hall £18000.00.

Other expensive areas included:

- The playground where the swings were repaired at a cost of £3432. And I thought timber grew on trees!
- The Bon Ami lease that had to be drawn up by a solicitor. This cost £3000.
- The two trees that were felled and the clearance of the jungle by the tennis courts. This cost £4600.
- The committee has also agreed to spend £2000. On the football pitch to bring the pitch back to a good order.

- Inside the hall, the kitchen ceiling has had the artex removed and then plastered and a working party from the committee painted the ceiling. We then had new LED strip lights installed. The committee also had new metal front doors fitted which should last 20 years or more costing £4145.
- There was also another large expense and that was the hall insurance, this cost £5000.

As the treasurer has outlined in his report the village hall committee has spent a considerable amount of money on the hall and the playing fields to keep it in good order for the future.

The bookings for the hall were slightly better than last year and appear to increase steadily, but they are still not at pre covid levels.

The committee applied for and received some more dog fouling bins for the crick, these were supplied by Hughenden Parish Council and they also see to the emptying of the bins.

The fund raising this last year has been exceptional with just over £44000 raised, a brilliant outcome from the committee and all the volunteers that have helped at all the fund raising events. Without them the hall would

struggle to exist, so thank you all for your great efforts. We also had a large will bequest from Mr. Sweet who lived in the village and the committee will spend this money on continuing improvement of the hall.

The committee are losing the longest serving member, Norma Clarke as she is moving away from the village to Sussex. Norma has been looking after the maintenance of the hall and playground for many years and will be missed for all the work she has done on the committee. If there is anyone who would like to join in helping run the many aspects of the hall, please come along to a meeting, usually on the first Monday of the month. Not only would it be nice to see you but you could find a niche to help with the running of the hall and keep it in a good order for the village.

I would like to express my thanks to the committee for all the support they have given me during the year and at the fundraising events and to the committee members that have organised these events. Without their success the village hall would not be the asset that it is for the village.

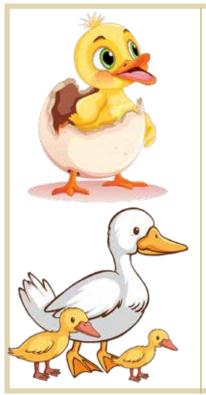
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#### Shear Madness

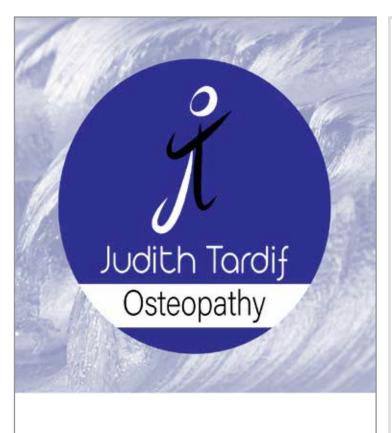

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Gravel paths and drives are an ideal way of cheaply and unobtrusively discouraging thieves from your garden. The gravel makes a loud noise underfoot which carries well at night, when any thief relies on moving around silently. For this reason, it is also worthwhile putting gravel near house windows or doors, as the noise of any movement on it may wake the owners or any dog.

Garden sheds are a prime target for intruders. Therefore, it is highly recommended that you regularly keep on top of the security of your shed, to ensure that the contents inside are as protected as possible at all times. Consider the use of a strong lockable box or cage within the shed in which you can store not only your garden tools but also insecticides, weed killers or other items which may be harmful to health or plants if improperly used.

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- An alarmed padlock, which can be used as a normal padlock or alarmed. It has a shock and movement sensor, a powerful 110 decibel siren, keyed operation, battery powered, a weather-resistant hardened Zinc Alloy body, hardened steel shackle, and an anti-muffle design. Price £12.

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#### Local Tales - Cherry Ripe

The Chiltern hills were traditionally renowned for their cherry orchards. The ups and downs and thin clay over chalk and flints was not easy to farm and the hills had spent most of their history covered in beech forest. Local names like Stocking Lane, Stocken Farm and Stokenchurch are believed to derive from the ancient Celtic for a stumpy place, suggesting forest clearing. Cherry trees, like the beech, thrived on the chalky soil and in my youth, when the Naphill Main Road was far less built upon, the gaps between the cottages, farms and pubs seemed filled by cherry blossom in the spring. Large orchards surrounded many villages and come harvest time there was a rush to pick the fruit and get it to market.

The cherries were black, and rather small compared with modern varieties, but my, no doubt biased memory, tells me that the taste seems to have been lessened as they were 'improved' over time. I believe that there were several local varieties or perhaps local names, such as Aylesbury Prune and Prestwood Black. Some of the old trees must still remain. I believe that the tree at the end of Purssell's Meadow may be one. The rush to get the crop picked before the birds ate them made necessary additional pickers and their families from afar. Many who came were known as 'travellers' and 'gypsies' who traditionally moved from place to place in tune with the various harvests of apples, corn and vegetables, etc. The cherry picking was arduous as the trees were very large compared with modern varieties and demanded massive eighty and fifty rung ladders with a four-foot spread to the base. We youngsters climbed and ate but could earn pocket money by collecting the buckets and baskets. Again, at other times, we could pick gooseberries and raspberries and the wild fruits like blackberries and crab apples, when in season. Mostly for jam making.

The hay harvest and the corn also needed school aged children to lend a hand and this gave rise to the long summer holiday. Parents might give pocket money for all sorts of daily tasks that needed doing. I collected bundles of lighting wood – twigs for lighting the fire. If collected from private woodland then this could only include dead twigs and branches that could be gathered 'by hook or by crook'. The bundles were traditionally bound with a withe – mostly a sprig of willow, osier or spindleberry. We, of course used cord, often bailer twine. I remember an old man saying that he had been 'collecting withes over on the diblock'. I didn't know what withes were or where or what the diblock was, but it stuck in my mind as a rather pleasing expression. I also collected sacks of dead leaves from the dells in the woods. These would be spread in the chicken run (pen) and it was great to see the excitement of the chickens as they clucked and scratched and pecked among new surroundings. Youngsters might be rewarded for feeding chickens or collecting their eggs or tending various animals.

On a lighter note, one seasonal means of collecting a little pocket money was by carol singing. In the festive season it was hoped that a small group of us could wander the village singing at doors in the hope of reward in the spirit of Christmas or simply to stop the discordant noise. We would make a few pence unless the householder could feign absence. If they did, a second carol was usually enough to convince them that they might get a third. I do remember one attempt was greeted by the householder heating pennies over his fire and bringing them to his door. Their acceptance could have been a painful experience except that he was carrying them on a small coal shovel which rather gave the game away.

We wish her well, not only for this most challenging aspect of her time, but for the whole three months.

#### News from St Michael's MU

Fur, Feathers and Fins -All creatures great and small, was the title of the wonderful talk given by Alan Jaycock, illustrated by his fabulous photographs.

Many of the extraordinary photos were taken at two places which protect endangered animals. Port Lympne Wild Life Park in Kent rears endangered species such as Mountain Gorillas so they can be put back to the wild in Central Africa. The Park also houses some Scottish wild cats - said to be the most vicious of all cats for its size. The Big Cat Centre (also in Kent) has lions, tigers, and leopards and many others that are endangered in the wild.

The feathers section of the talk was represented by fantastic photographs taken in the Farne Islands, where sadly many birds were lost last year due to bird flu.

Arctic Terns migrate annually as far as the Antarctic and these feisty birds are very protective of their area and, as Alan pointed out, a hat is a must as a guard against being dive bombed. Other photos were of guillemots and of course the much-loved puffin.

On to fins. A particularly wonderful shot was of an Osprey diving in for a catch.

Others included dolphins seen from The Wild Life Survey boat off the West Coast of Scotland.

Many thanks to Alan for such an interesting talk and some stunning photographs - it makes us realise how much we need to be aware of and look after all God's creatures both great and small.

Our next meeting is on Tuesday June 4th at 2pm, to which everyone is welcome.

#### From the Vicarage

Soon after we returned from a memorable parish pilgrimage to the Holy Land at the end of February 2020, we began experimenting with recording sermons in church, with a view to posting them up on our website later that year.

Little did we know that within three weeks, our lives as we knew them would change dramatically overnight, as Covid-19 spread, and we were instructed by the then Prime Minister Boris Johnson to remain at home wherever possible. Churches closed overnight, as did the vast majority of shops and other businesses, unless they were considered crucial, such as supermarkets.

We found ourselves residing in bubbles, and began exploring something called Zoom, to stay in touch with friends and family and to do business virtually.

From the outset Hughenden Church had an online presence, starting with simple services, before getting more ambitious and involving contributions from others, such as pre-recorded bible readings and prayers.

We launched St Michaels @ 10 on a Sunday, and following our online service, we met for virtual coffee and fellowship, in order to maintain a degree of contact with each other for mutual support.

Up and down the country, neighbourhoods became more proactive in setting up WhatsApp groups and other support networks. This became the lifeblood which kept the most vulnerable in our communities well supplied with food, medicine and other essentials. Meanwhile our NHS made us proud with an extraordinary effort to care for the sick and the dying, as well as many other caring and emergency services.

We are now four years on from those dreadful days. However, our online presence, through Hughenden Church YouTube channel is really appreciated by many who tune in regularly, either live, or at a later date, to share in our Christian worship.

I know that each service gets at least 50 views each week, and some many more than that. Some who became virtual worshippers during lockdown then went on to join us in person once restrictions eased, and are now part of our church family. Others are not able to be with us in person, either due to illness or mobile challenges, personal circumstances or a busy life – and if that applies to you, may I say that I very much consider you part of our worshipping community as well!

If you watch us from time to time online, please can I ask you a favour? We would love to hear more feedback from you. How does it feel to watch online? What do you appreciate? How could we change?

We have excellent cameras in our church, which enable us to produce a good quality presentation. However, we are challenged in a couple of ways – first and foremost the church does not have fibre-optic broadband connection, so that can sometimes affect our quality of streaming – please bear with us. Secondly, there are Sundays when there isn't an online service, and that is because we don't have enough trained operators on our team. Perhaps you might be interested in joining our team. Training is provided. Please have a word with me in the first instance if this is a possibility and I will pass you on to our wonderful media team.

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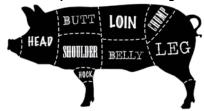
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#### Valley Players - Goodbye to a special player!

Many Gazette readers may not know that High Wycombe has its own orchestra, Wycombe Sinfonia. The orchestra, made up of talented adult instrumentalists from the local area, was founded in 1985 by it's conductor, John Dunnett, who some may remember from his time as a teacher at John Hampden School and also as the conductor of the Wycombe Music Centre Senior Orchestra.

Wycombe Sinfonia performances are of a very high standard and concerts are held three times a year at St Mary's Parish Church in Wycombe, which has wonderful acoustics, (and very comfortable seats and also toilets now). Usually the orchestra performs a full Symphony or Concerto with a guest soloist, but this concert on May 11th is different in that they are performing a number of shorter pieces. It should therefore be an excellent introductory concert for those who have not been to their concerts before, and also be of particular interest to the many RAF personel in our villages, including as it does the **RAF March Past** and the **Dambusters March**. **The Trombone Concerto** in this concert should also be interesting for any young person learning a brass instrument, and admission for under 18's is always free.

Afterwards, Mrs Barton visited to educate Years One and Two about climate and weather. Maybe some will be the weather-forecasters of the future!

Finally, Mrs McKinstry came and taught Year Five about being an Equine Veterinarian; showing some horse X-rays and her ultra-sound machine.

So, to sum it all up, we all had a spectacular Science Week and our future careers may have been shaped by these inspirational visitors!!

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#### **Friends of Naphill Common**



I'm sorry to have to report that the Japanese Knotweed has reappeared in the area at the end of Downley Road, close to Daisy Pond. We had hoped that we might have eliminated it, but as many will know, it's extremely hard to kill off completely and we must do our best to keep it under control. It's down from an area about the size of a tennis court to just a handful of plants – the Estate are aware and will be spraying it with herbicide, while we have found the most effective method to be injecting the stem with a systemic herbicide.

We're preparing our activities for the summer. We hope to have a walk around Bradenham farm to view the

wonderful wildflower meadows for which the farmer, Andrew Stubbings, has been nationally praised. David Brown, who gave a talk on Bomber Command at the AGM in February, has offered to lead a small group to view the preserved office from which Sir Arthur 'Bomber' Harris directed operations during the Second World War. And there will be our ever-popular bat walk – watch out for more details!

## RAF High Wycombe By Royal Command!

RAF High Wycombe's PA to the Chaplain-in-Chief, Brenda Brown was one of one hundred and fifty people (seventy-five female, seventy-five male – seventy-five denoting the age of King Charles III) to take part in a ceremony dating back to the Middle Ages. The monarch or royal official dispenses 'Maundy Money' to deserving senior citizens – a custom that dates to the time of King Edward I in the Thirteenth Century.

The invitation to be a recipient came out of the blue when a Buckingham Palace marked envelope arrived at Brenda's house. "I kept thinking why me? I just couldn't believe it!" said the astonished mother of three. Recipients are normally nominated by their local diocese (in this case the Bishop of Oxford Diocese) in recognition for service to the church or local community. Brenda has a long history of working with the chaplaincy and has arranged many events involving both Windsor Castle and Buckingham Palace.

Did you know....? Royal Maundy (the name dates back to Jesus Christ and the Last Supper meaning 'instruction') is a service normally presided over by the monarch and held the day before Good Friday or Maundy Thursday.

Building started on Worcester Cathedral in the Eleventh Century and proved to be a perfect backdrop for the age-old event. Guests were given name badges before hearing the bishop's pulpit speech. The Press were in attendance. Brenda's cousin contacted her after the event to say that she had even made the news in Australia!

Did you know...? During the fourth or fifth century church leaders ceremoniously washed the feet of the poor following Holy Communion on Maundy Thursday. Monarchs throughout the ages continued the tradition, but it is thought to have stopped in the mid Eighteenth Century. The ceremony itself was a spectacle. "It was a fanfare with HRH Queen Camilla who was attended by the Bishop of Worcester and the Sub-Dean from St James's Palace. Completing the entourage were trumpeters and gold braided beefeaters," said a clearly emotional Brenda.

Meeting the Queen was a surreal experience for the Chaplain-in-Chief's PA, and a little surprise awaited her. All were all told to do a little curtsy and a bow after being handed the purses and to say thank you. "The bishop then said 'we have a very special lady here' as the Queen approached me. I was not expecting this and can only remember doing a half curtsy. The Queen then asked me how long I had been doing my role, and for the life of me I cannot remember what I said – I was so shocked! She spoke in a whisper, warmly put her hand on mine and said, 'thank you for your service.' I will never forget that loving squeeze of the hand – it was so special."

Did you know....? 'Maundy Money' comprises of silver coins. Further money is also given in lieu of clothing or gifts that the monarch had originally bestowed in times gone by. Coins are presented in two leather purses, a white one containing silver coins to the value of the monarch's age and a red purse containing a £5 coin and a 50p coin. The coins are legal tender.

And Brenda's abiding memory of the day?

"Unbelievable! So humbling. I still cannot believe it happened to me. 1000s of names must be put forward. I just can't believe it, such a memorable, fantastic day where we were treated so well."

Growing Your Own - Who would have thought it!

It is said that Queen Victoria, had she been told that she shared 98% of her genes with a monkey, would not have "been amused". Well, had she been told that she was descended from green algal slime she would probably have been incandescently apoplectic. What goes for queens also goes for everyone else. Yes, inhabitants of Naphill and Walter's Ash, you are descended from green algal slime.

It all started about 600 million years ago, when there was life in the oceans but nothing at all on land – no plants, no animals, and certainly no people. Then, from a warm freshwater pool, some green algal slime ventured onto land. That was followed by fungi, which combined with the green algal slime in a symbiotic relationship to form lichens. Different varieties of fungi formed different symbiotic relationships with different algae to form different varieties of lichens. Today, lichens cover an eighth of the land area of planet earth. Some lichens developed to form plants, which put down roots and propagated via flowers. Trees absorbed carbon dioxide and emitted oxygen which changed the earth's atmosphere for ever. Eventually oxygen-breathing animals evolved from the plants and dinosaurs emerged. In the following millions of years there were five great extinctions when almost all life forms perished. The one we are most familiar with is the hit of a very large meteorite which caused an abrupt climate change which killed all the dinosaurs. Then mammals emerged including the monkeys and apes with which we share about 98% of our genes.

Through the latter period the lichens, fungi and millions of other micro-organisms prospered in the soil which was being formed from decaying plant material. Decaying trees were turned into soil by fungi and plants generally prospered in the soil. Early humans hunted wild animals for food and, later, turned to agriculture, which permitted a great expansion of mankind. We are very dependent on fungi for our food, since 90% of plants have mycorrhizal fungi round their roots, supplying water and essential minerals. One of the biggest limits to plant growth is the scarcity of phosphorus, of which up to 100% is supplied by mycorrhizal fungi (and 80% of a plant's nitrogen). The mycorrhizal fungi grow within plant roots and extend them by up to 100 times, seeking trace elements from afar. Fungi are neither animal nor vegetable, but they are closer to animal. They take surplus carbohydrates from plants and give back water and trace elements in return. A truly symbiotic relationship. A plant seed that finds no compatible fungi is unlikely to survive. So we need, on our farmland and in our gardens and allotments, to look after the mycorrhizal fungi and other soil microbes which are doing such a fantastic job for us. So, no artificial fertilisers, pesticides, fungicides and all the other "cides" which kill our friends.

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#### Gordon the Birdman

Have you heard a hooting male Tawny Owl recently? Or the short 'Ke-wick' call of the female? Tawny Owls are Britain's most numerous and widespread owls. So, there is every chance you will have a pair close to where you live. Although 20,000 pairs of Tawny Owls breed in the UK, many of them close to human habitation, a face to face with one of these night time predators is very rare. Unlike Barn, Short Eared and Little Owl, all of whom can be seen hunting by day, Tawny Owls are one of our most nocturnal birds, perhaps second only to the even more enigmatic Long Eared Owl (which, prior to the beginning of the first world war was our most numerous owl but has not adapted to urbanisation). Tawny Owls spend the day pressed up against tree trunks or hidden in dense thickets of ivy, invisible to all but the sharpest eyes and emerging only after dark. You might be alerted to a roosting Tawny by the alarm calls of smaller birds as they attempt to scare off the intruder, but most of the time the owl will stay put, ignoring the noise and appearing to go to sleep. The difficulty of getting a good view of a Tawny Owl means the species is tricky to survey using traditional methods. However, it's loud and familiar calls coupled with the fact that they remain on their territories year-round makes surveying easier.

Tawny Owls breed early in the year with the female laying up to five eggs some time from late February into March. Young birds do not disperse very far from where they hatch, with the average distance being just four kilometres.

Whereas Tawny Owls are the commonest and most widespread owl across almost all of England, Scotland and Wales they are absent from Ireland with just one recording in 2013. This appears to have been a one-off as Tawny Owls are reluctant to cross large expanses of water.

Last winter's influx of Bramblings into the garden did not repeat itself this year, with just two males appearing during March but this was compensated by over twenty Siskins with three still here. The first summer visitors were a Chiffchaff 06-04 and Blackcap 12-04 though these have been birds that had overwintered here. So, the first genuine migrants were a Spotted Flycatcher swooping on insects from one of the apple trees and two Wheatears seen on Lodge Hill both on 14-04.

A Brimstone butterfly was recorded in the garden on 15-02 with Peacock and Small Tortoishell on 18-03. These would have overwintered as adults. The first of this year's hatching being a Holly Blue 26-03 and Orange Tip 02-04.

So here we are in May. Yikes! It's already the 5th month of the year! Where is the time going to?

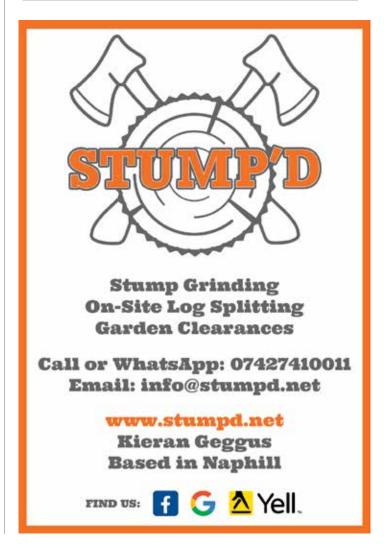
May is always a joyful month, marking the end of winter and beginning of summer. It is a month of planting and blossoming. I always thought the month of May owed its name to the prolific flowering at this time of Crataegus monogyna, aka the common hawthorn or May blossom. However, the name reaches beyond our shores and back in time to the Roman Empire, the month of May being named for the Greek goddess Maia, identified as Bona Dea by the Romans. Maia or Bona Dea was a goddess of fertility both in women and of the land. Bona Dea literally means 'good goddess' and her worship was exclusively the preserve of women, her festival being held on 1st May. The Roman poet Ovid provides a different explanation, saying that the month of May is named for the maiores, Latin for "elders," and that the following month (June) is named for the iuniores, or "young people". Either of these explanations May be correct. Personally, I think May is so named because the weather may be fine and warm or it may be miserable and damp.

Hopefully, we will be blessed with fine, warm days and clear skies so we will be able to see the Eta Aquariids meteor shower. The shower is one of a number of meteor showers linked to Halley's Comet, becoming visible from about April 19 to about May 28 each year. Unlike most major annual meteor showers, there is no sharp peak for this shower, but rather a broad maximum with good rates that last approximately one week around May 5. The best place to look is towards the constellation Aquarius, between east and south east after midnight.

In the Northern Hemisphere, the month of May has long been regarded as one of celebration. May Day has ancient roots in pre-Christian culture across Europe, whether it be linked with Greeks, Romans or the Celtic Beltane. Christians too celebrate at this time, with the feasts of Ascension Day (9th) and Pentecost, aka Whitsun (19th). Ascension marks the day Jesus ascended to Heaven. Pentecost marks the day when the Holy Spirit is sent to Jesus' followers, enabling them to speak in unlearned languages, perform miracles and know the continuing presence of Jesus in their everyday lives. It marks the end of the Easter celebrations, so if you are still munching your way through all those Easter eggs, it's fine – the celebration of Easter lasts until Pentecost.

As the months whiz on, it is all too easy to be caught up in a whir of activity and suddenly another year has passed. The Christian Church provides a framework within which to focus our busyness. There are times of quiet reflection, such as Lent, then times of celebration, such as Easter. Planting, harvest, birth, death and resurrection all form part of the cycle within which we can pace our lives. The month of May moves us on from the death and Resurrection of Jesus to living with his presence in our everyday lives.

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### **Naphill Neighbours**

The title of our talk was ' Blood, Bikers and Babies'; it is also the title of the charity. The purpose of the charity is to respond as rapid response couriers during out of hours emergencies. They have 100 local volunteers covering Oxon, Bucks, Berks and Northants; the area has 26 large hospitals and the couriers ride the charities' own motorbikes to transport urgently needed blood, or frozen breast milk for premature babies, and surgical instruments that are required for specific operations.

The charity was formed in 1962. Last year the couriers had 3,357 call outs. The service these volunteer couriers provide is free and runs on public donations and sponsorship; corporate sponsors are BP and the AA breakdown service. BMW and Yamaha bikes are used, supplemented by two 4x4 cars.

The couriers are all keen bikers and respond to call outs overnight and at weekends. They have to be at least 25 years of age, experienced and willing to be called out at any time of night. They have to stick to the speed limits but usually make good time because of the lack of traffic at the times they are travelling.

Our members had not heard of this service and found it very interesting.

as well as inspiring. It is good to know there are unselfish people about who are willing to serve others in this way; without financial rewards.

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### Exam season is upon us again and you may know a young person who really struggles with exam anxiety.

Mind / Body Connection- Fear and anxiety are powerful emotions which slow down blood supply to the brain and other organs, producing stress hormones (cortisol and adrenaline) in response to a perceived threat. These hormones prepare us for action in an emergency but are not useful for exams!

- Where possible, try and get personal recommendations from friends and family with first hand & recent experience of a service.
- Check for appropriate licences, insurance, DBS, canine first aid, etc and follow up on any references.
- Visit the property your pooch will be staying at and ask to see kennels/sleeping areas and what a typical day would look like. If looking at home boarders, ensure your dog meets with any other dogs that may reside at the property.

Sadly the tow path which is usually our return route from Temple Lock was impassable but we were already prepared for just walking there and back through the fields and woods so it was fine. We saw or heard 37 birds including a Water Rail which was a first for most of us, and ended our trip with a really good breakfast at the George and Dragon (highly recommended) and we shall certainly be doing it again next year even if it does mean getting up at 4.45 am!

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It is a constant and universal truth for the entirety of civilisation that our social lives and relationships are a living embodiment of dessert wines. This may sound like a wild comparison too far this time but bear with me...

I'm sure you would all agree that the cornucopia of technological advancements make keeping in touch with friends past and present a easy thing to do. In theory. However, the reality of a busy modern lifestyle is that actually doing so is near impossible, despite all our best intentions to the contrary. This is especially true now that the pandemic is a mere memory and Zoom's share price has dropped 90% from late 2020! And so... we find ourselves at every gathering, wedding, christening or chance meeting in the street uttering those clichéd words 'Oh we must do this again soon' or 'Yeah, I'll give a you a call and we'll get together' knowing only too well that this is definitely not going to happen, even though you really do want it to be true and you really are intending on calling.

This is exactly the same as our interactions with dessert wine. When we eat an above average establishment (which can usually be defined as anywhere that serves dessert wine!) and end the evening with some sweet amber nectar to accompany our pud we say the same things. As the unctuous and divine drops of sweet, sweet heaven hit our lips we think to ourselves - 'we really should do this more' and 'let's not wait another year before doing this again'. Every time I convince myself it is to become part of my weekly drinking cycle and that this time it will be different. I lecture myself about how ridiculous it is to enjoy something this much and not repeat it regularly, but really I know I won't see it again until Tom and Sarah's wedding next Summer, or maybe on New Year's Eve. We all know that to actually be as regularly sociable as we claim we will be would not only be utterly exhausting but also absolutely impossible based on the current nature of time. Drinking more dessert wine, however, is an achievable and noble aim. With just a little commitment we can make it a reality - 'If you give just £10 per month...'

So, what sweet wine should we be trying? How long is a piece of string...? There are many types dessert wine, each deserving of thousands of words. However, brevity is sometimes King, so here is snapshot of just a few:

- Noble Not made from grapes that have been attacked by Botrytis cinerea. While it sounds (and looks) a bit gross, it adds unique flavours (ginger, saffron, and honey). Look for the big dogs; Sauternes and Tokaji Aszu. Also look for Sauternes' neighbours Monbazillac or Barsac.
- 2. Late Harvest This means exactly what it says on the tin; the grapes are harvested late on in the season to allow more sugar. Most common types are made from Chenin Blanc, Semillon and Riesling. Often golden in colour and a great match for fruity desserts.
- Fortified The world of fortified wines is too large to it justice in what is almost a footnote and so I think a future article on these is in order. For now, I'll keep it ultra brief – Port and Pedro Ximenez Sherry.
- 4. Eiswein –a fairly rare and pricey style owing to the exact conditions needed to produce it: one, it only occurs in bizarre years when a vineyard freezes. Two, eiswein must be harvested and pressed while grapes are still frozen. Therefore, it will come as no surprise that cool climate regions produce this style, with Canada being the biggest producer in the world. Style wise, think of a purer, more intense version of Noble Rot.
