Does it sometimes feel as though recycling is just too hard? According to a [report](#) published last year in the Guardian, 80% (yes, 80%!) of us are still unclear about how to recycle effectively.

It has been suggested that 'labelling' requires a doctorate in semiotics to decode, kerbside collections are a postcode lottery and council recycling centres are often difficult to access without a car.
