Naphill Village Hall and Playing Fields

Chairman's Report

The September meeting of the village hall committee was held on the 3 September. Among the points discussed were adopting the decision making protocol. An equalities policy was circulated and after discussion the committee agreed to adopt the policy. The hallmaster diary/calendar will now be used to enable us to see what activities are taking place on the Crick and if we decide that the more regular users are charging for group activities we feel that a charge should be made for using the facilities.

Approval has been given to the maintenance committee to purchase a new extractor fan for the kitchen. Also replacing the car park posts, putting 2 new doors on the changing rooms and having the pointing done on the path and wall surrounding the war memorial. It was agreed that this would cost £4100. We are also looking into having the audio cabinet replaced with a new system costing £1500 to £2000.

The fundraising for the play equipment is ongoing with the Christmas fayre on the Friday 30 November allocating the money raised to the play equipment fund. A Tack sale will be held on Saturday 27th. October with monies raised also going to the play fund. A local company has promised to donate £1000 and individual donations have also been offered. Unfortunately our application for funding from the Calor Community Fund was not successful, this was the last of our bids for funding. The initial equipment for the toddlers appears to cost in the region of £15000 and when this is in place we will continue to install more items for the children to play on, so the fundraising will continue. If you would like to donate, you can via the naphillvillagehall.org.uk website and click on the link to donate, all donations will be used for the playground equipment.

At the meeting of the village hall committee a proposal was made for a smaller management committee of


Trustees who would meet monthly for decision making and then a larger meeting for all stakeholders which would take place quarterly. The trustees agreed to consider the constitution of this monthly group before the next meeting where further discussion will take place. Any changes would need to be included as amendments to the Scheme and therefore can only be agreed at the AGM.

The Napfest committee has already met for next year's event and Linda Clark has agreed to be the chairman. The 2019 event will be on 7/8/9 June. The flypast and the marquee have been booked and the theme will be The Circus.

The fireworks on 3rd. November is also going to be a great event with £6000 worth of fireworks, a bonfire and for this year live music before and after the event. Tickets will soon be available from local shops and pubs and also from the website. It is an event that has a good attendance and we have limited the number of spectators to 3000 this year, so make sure that you buy your tickets while they are still available.

What Are We Doing About Our Missing Playground Equipment?



The Village Hall Council is acutely aware of the lack of a facility for young children and is doing its best to fill the space left by the removal of the toddler unit. The activity trail will come later.

At present, our focus is on a replacement unit for children aged 2 to 6. We have some facilities for older children but the little ones are left with 2 swings and 2 springers. There have been some disappointed faces this summer. It is necessary to get three designs and quotes for a new unit because the cost will be of the order of £15,000. This is in hand. Three companies have visited, taken measurements, and are submitting suggestions; the intention is to present these to the Village Hall Council meeting at the beginning of October so a decision can be made. The Parish Council has offered a grant of £5000 provided we match that amount and organise events to raise a further £5000.

Now that the long hot summer is over it is time to raise funds specifically for the playground. This is necessary because the Council has recently had to spend about £20,000 on a flat roof and more roof work is required. Judy Whitehouse, our secretary, has made a number of grant applications on the Council's behalf with no success to date.

Some events and sources of funds are in the

pipeline. We hope the Co-op Community Fund will be helping us again, for this specific purpose. We were very grateful for the £2000 + that was raised for us last year. Linda Clarke is arranging a 'Tack' sale in October (details elsewhere in the Gazette). Profits from the Christmas Fayre on November 30th will go towards the initial £5000 target. Funds can also be donated on the 'Donate' page on our website (www. naphillvillagehall.org.uk.).

Raising money for the popular table tennis table was a huge success. Can we do something similar for the playground? Once we have funds in place for the new toddler unit, we need to consult our 'juniors' and raise money for a new activity trail to go in the large empty grassy space. At a guess, the cost of this will be getting on for £30,000. SO THERE IS MUCH TO DO.

I have written at length so there are no misconceptions about the progress we are making, and how much more there is to do.

Peter Williams Resigns as a Parish Councillor

Please be aware that in July I resigned from the Parish Council. There is never a good time to leave but given the Council didn't sit again till September it was intended to minimise the impact of my departure by doing this before the summer break.

I always felt it my duty to stay on whilst our residents were underrepresented around the Council table with a depleted number of Councillors, however, I am delighted that this is no longer the case. Naphill & Walter's Ash now has two new Councillors co-opted in June and another has recently joined for Hughenden Valley. Growing Your Own

Well, what a summer! By my reckoning, in Naphill and Walter's Ash we had no rain at all from the end of the first week of May to the end of the first week of August. In addition to the rain problem, it was reported that in our part of the UK it was the warmest summer on record, with temperatures in the 30s on some days. I noticed that the sun was extremely penetrating and official statistics bear that out. This year we had over 30 per cent more sunshine than normal. The extra sunshine benefitted some crops but frazzled others in the hot, dry conditions. Some seeds would not germinate, no matter how frequently I watered. Very few weeds germinated. My allotment soil was like dust for the first couple of inches. Then I made a most important discovery. More on that later.

As for my crops, all my cucurbits (courgettes, marrows, pumpkins and squashes) were eaten by muntjac deer desperate for water. I managed to keep my carrots alive in the early stages by repeated watering. There were a few positive surprises. My beetroot were just amazing; I did not water them but they germinated and grew rapidly, having the ability to seek out water in the lower depths of the soil. This happened to my outdoor tomatoes also. I did not water them at all and they produced the best crop ever.

Now for my discovery, which I have never seen in textbooks or wherever. On 3rd August, with my allotment soil like dust to a depth of a couple of inches, I lifted a brick. The soil under the brick was very moist. In the rainless period a row of carrots grown within three inches of some impermeable black plastic was double the height of an adjacent row further away from the black plastic (see photo). Then it dawned on me that moisture in the subsoil rises to the surface by capillary action and then evaporates into the air. On encountering my brick or impermeable black plastic it could not evaporate so stayed there – and made the soil near my first row of

carrots moist, hence the row grew at twice the rate of the adjacent row of identical seed sown on the same day. This discovery would not have been possible in a normal year but in 2018, with such an extreme level of dryness, the discovery was made.



The forecasters say that such summers will occur with increasing frequency and by 2050 will be the norm. Therefore I shall cut 12-inch wide strips of black plastic and place them between my rows of vegetables to gain from this phenomenon. And slightly ridging the soil between the rows to also gain from run-off when it rains. And no weeds!

She worked happily in the furniture industry until retirement at 70. She was well known in the local furniture industry for her skills as a machinist. Iris always said she had enjoyed her work and never found it a chore.

She was a gifted seamstress and made beautiful clothes for herself and her family. Her beautiful hand knitted jumpers were welcome gifts worn by many friends and family members, their children and grand-children.

Iris's cake baking was legendary. Her Victoria sponges often won first prize at the Naphill Horticultural Society shows and her Lemon Drizzle Cake is still one of the best you will ever taste.

When Linsey started riding Iris became involved as groom and driver for horse shows. She was quickly recruited as a member of the OBH Hughenden Pony Club Committee providing the catering for various Pony Club events.

Alan Lewis: a Reminiscence

It will be a source of much sadness for many but perhaps not a great surprise for some that Alan Frederick Grantley Lewis (AFGL in his original Sunday Times byline) died peacefully at home amongst his family on the 9th of August. Some of us will remember a great man but the village will miss a great character. His talents always tempered by his keen sense of humour ranged from the literary to the musical and he leaves behind a typically idiosyncratic legacy.

Alan was born and brought up initially in Birmingham and he could still render a passing imitation of the sayings of those bards of the Black Country Enoch and Eli complete with the correct Brummy nasal twang. However, as a lad he was translated from the Birmingham metropolis to the rural but backward idylls of Herefordshire where he loved and lost his dog. His schooling must have been good as he was elevated to the world class science and engineering excellence of Imperial College London where, in the Royal School of Mines, he read metallurgy. This proved an interesting choice but not one that fulfilled all his talents. With other foolish undergraduates he sometimes indulged in mischief – famously informing the police that the men in the high-vis jackets digging a hole in Exhibition Road were in fact student impostors and then, in turn, telling those same men in high-vis jackets in Exhibition Road that the approaching policemen were in fact student impostors. Mayhem followed!

Few could play the piano as well as Alan. His sight reading of new music was remarkable and he ranged from the classics to popular music with ease. In recent time he provided a light musical background to the monthly lunches held in Naphill Village Hall and some of us will long remember his meltingly mellifluous rendition of J S Bach's 'Sheep may safely graze' at St John's church, Lacey Green. His literary bent eventually led him to the delicately onerous task of editing the house journal of the Cement and Concrete Association. Following major office reconstruction and refurbishment, the editorial suite was allocated to the former gentlemen's lavatories. Alan thus became the 'First Loo-tenant' soon to be joined by a 'Second Loo-tenant' but a uniform was not prescribed. Alan's special brand of humour combined with a fastidious regard for the English language eventually resulted in him becoming a paronomasiac, or someone addicted to word play. Long ago the Sunday Times benefited from his pithy contributions and a series of 'Weakly through' calendars. Eventually, his minimum opus 'Pundemomium' hit the bookshelves along with a forward by Gyles Brandreth. As the cover explained 'People who engage in wordplay certainly get up to sem antics'. Alan's literary and musical skills combined spectacularly in his joint creation with Trevor Pilling of 'Below Stairs' a musical play set at the beginning of World War 1. It has enjoyed a wide production over the years luring the modern audiences addicted to 'Downton Abbey' to join an older generation reared on 'Upstairs Downstairs'

All these skills were paraded for the delectation of Alan's University of the Third Age creative writing group where as coffee cups were being cleared he occasionally concluded with an impromptu serenade from a fine old Steinway grand piano lurking in our generous host's home.

If Alan's life has enjoyed many of the elements of a theatrical production then it has all been made possible by his co-star and leading lady, Christine, and his extended family in full supporting roles. He has been lucky to have them all just as we have been lucky to have had Alan in our midst.


